In his words, "It was the Band that made it work. It wasn't me." Principal Trumpet Michael Rotman said he was glad to be challenged to bring a new level of concentration and focus to his performance. Oboist Stan Levine said it "felt good to me as a way to continue to be a part of the group."

The response to that first project was so overwhelmingly positive that Maestro Allen decided to try another one. This time he dedicated it to all first responders. This is the Band's way of thanking, honoring and recognizing those most essential workers in their selfless devotion to their chosen, demanding professions. On first

seeing the finished products, Judy Reiter, who doubles on piccolo and flute, "was so pleased with what maestro did with the video."

Executive Director Jim Starr knows how valuable these performances are. "This was a unique opportunity to provide an in-home concert," he said. The spirit of the Band comes through the technology."


